### Thinking About Grad School?

#### What is Graduate School?

- Grad school is *not* like undergrad
  - Focus is more on research, less on coursework
- Classes are typically small, discussionoriented
- Work with individual faculty members

#### Is Grad School for Me?

- Think seriously about this question.
- Do I enjoy and do well at academic activities?
- Consider time involved (5-7 years)
  - MA: 1-2 years
  - PhD: 3-4 years (~5 total; ~6 for clinical)
  - − PsyD: ~5 years
- Consider other psych-related jobs

#### What Area Interests Me?

- Clinical
  - Specializations (e.g., forensic, child)
- Experimental/Research
  - Do you get excited about research?
  - Do you like writing papers?
  - What questions could hold your interest for 5-6 years?
- Other psych-related areas
  - Community Health Sciences, School Psychology
- What area = What people interest me?

### What Do Grad Schools Look For?

- Very Important:
  - 1. Letters of recommendation
  - 2. Personal statement/goals & objectives
  - 3. Research Experience
  - 4. GPA\*
  - 5. Graduate Records Examination (GRE) Scores\*
  - 6. Interview
- Less Important:
  - 7. Clinically-related public service
  - 8. Work experience
  - 9. Extracurricular activities

#### How Much Will It Cost Me?

- Apply to *many* programs (5-6 for experimental; 7-10 for clinical)
- Application Fee: \$30-100 per school
- GREs: \$150-200 per test
- GRE score reports: \$15 per school
- Transcripts: \$8 each (1-2 per school)
- Postage: \$10-30 per school
- Apply for U of W application-fee bursary

### Graduate Records Examination

#### GRE General

- Verbal, quantitative, and analytical writing sections.
- Guidebooks: Princeton Review, Kaplan
- Start early! Study and write during summer.

#### GRE Subject (Psychology)

- General psychology knowledge
- Intro/2<sup>nd</sup> year level
- Easier, also less important than the General.
- Try to write in November. Register early!

#### What GRE Score Do I Need?

- Median Scores:
  - Verbal: 570
  - Quantitative: 630
  - Psychology: 640
- Often, the top Canadian schools look for scores above the 80<sup>th</sup> percentile.
- Combined 1100 is okay, 1200 is good, 1300 is better.

# 2+ Years Before Applying

- Take a breadth of courses & get good grades
  - i.e., try for an A- average
  - especially statistics and methodology!
- Make connections with faculty
  - seminars, independent readings, TAs, social events
- Get research experience
  - RAs, NSERC, USRA-HS
- (Clinical Students) Get relevant volunteer experience

### Application Year: Summer

- Investigate schools/programs
  - Note deadlines!
  - Consider contacting potential advisors to ask whether they're taking students
- Take the general GRE
- Register & study for the subject GRE
- Get a research-related job
- Save money!

# Application Year: August

- Select schools (i.e., people).
  - Read their research.
  - Gauge their reputation, as a researcher and advisor.
  - Find students and professors who know them.
- "Nominal" and "Actual" processes
  - Nominal: Forms, committee
  - Actual(?): Is someone willing to supervise you
    as a student? Is there money to pay for you?

# Application Year: Fall

- Be organized and aware of deadlines.
  - US deadlines are typically 4-6 weeks earlier.
- Request reference letters well in advance (i.e., at *least* three weeks)
  - Provide information package to your writers.
- Write and re-write your statement of purpose. Get feedback. Re-write again.
- Request transcripts early (they take a week).

# Apply for Fellowship Funding

- SSHRC (\$17,500)
  - personality, social, developmental, history, educational
- NSERC (\$17,300, x 2 years)
  - physiological, perception, cognition, neuroscience
- CIHR (\$17,500)
  - health sciences, applied clinical research
- OGS (\$15,000)
  - Any topic, but only tenable in Ontario

# Tips While Applying

- Keep copies of everything you send to a school.
- File all email correspondence.
- Consider sources of funding
  - Is there a separate funding application?
  - i.e., fellowship, department, advisor, TAs
- (After acceptance) Ask if you can contact current students.
  - Investigate your program & advisor!
