

Choosing your Grad School







2 Essential Attributes

1. Program with a good BALANCE between research & clinical work

2. Awesome supervisor in a research area you enjoy

A Balanced Program:

- views Clinical Psychology as an evidence-based health profession
- adopts the Scientist-Practitioner (Boulder) model: clinical psychologists should be competent in conducting research and providing psychological services
- emphasizes the development, evaluation and use of evidence-based assessment and treatment strategies

A Great Supervisor:

- provides instruction and encouragement with respect to all graduate work
- provides <u>regular</u> feedback on your work
- provides guidance & stimulate research
- is approachable (a pseudo-friend)

This should never happen...but it most certainly will happen...

Qualifying Examinations

Why? (oh God, why?!)

- basically, to see if you've been doing the work/paying attention
- demonstrate competence in applying broad base of knowledge accumulated throughout graduate school in an exam or research project

What is PQS?

"Post-Quals Slump", or PQS, affects 99% of all grad students. It is the #1 cause of delayed graduation dates and contributes to the Ph. D. degree drop-rate.

What are the symptoms of PQS?

Symptoms include:

- Inability to maintain interest in research area
- Advisor Avoidance
- Increased web-surfing
- Healthy sleeping pattern
- Cynicism towards Academia

How long does PQS last?

PQS is incurable. With proper treatment, its main symptoms may last up to 5 years.

How do I treat PQS?

Experimental treatments such as Advisor-Pressure (AP), Spousal-Income-Frustration (SIF), Lackof-Savings-Realization (LSR) and "cocktails" of these have known to cause a remission of the disease long enough to at least defend a thesis. More severe treatments are required to actually finish writing the thesis



You Know you're a 3+ Year Ph.D student when...



Thesis/Dissertation

Master's Thesis:

- Show familiarity with literature in the subject of thesis
- Appropriate research methods used
- Show that critical analysis has been applied
- Original contribution to knowledge in field

Doctoral Dissertation:

- Evidence of critical understanding of literature
- Original work
- Significant contribution to knowledge in field of study
- Publishable

Pre-Doctoral Internship in Clinical Psychology

- 1-year paid internship
- 31 training sites in Canada with 56 programs
 & over 100 positions
 - Example: Site = U of M Dept. of Clinical Health Psych; Program = Adult stream; Positions available = 2
- Stipends range from \$0 (Quebec) to \$46,000 (Winnipeg)

2007 APPIC MATCH STATISTICS FOR APPLICANTS FROM CANADIAN SCHOOLS AND PROGRAMS IN CANADA

- Applicants Participating in the Match: 111
- MATCH RESULTS
 - Applicants Matched: 86 (77%)
 - To Canadian Programs: 80 (93%)
 - To U.S. Programs: 6 (7%)
 - Participating Applicants Not Matched 25 (23%)

- 5) Get involved in side projects where possible

Will's Top 10 Tips for Surviving Grad School in Clinical Psych

- 6) Go to conferences
- 7) Don't waste your time thinking / talking about how busy you are...
- 8) Keep records of everything
- 9) Develop a good relationship with your supervisor (if not...ditch him/her!)
- 10) Acknowledge that the life of a student is really not that bad

Recent Data on Grad Students in Psychology (Canada)


- Avg age of completing PhD in Psych = 34
- Significant minority of psychology students in their doctoral programs for 8-10 years (PhD only), but average is 6 years
- Best estimate of PhD completed & registered to practice psychology = 35 years
- 35% of Psychology Faculty are over 55 years of age

Trends in Clinical Psych

- Trend with psychologists (esp. in clinical practice) to retire earlier than 65 years
 - burn out, heavy emotional toll (work with difficult and needy individuals), rewards not concrete
 - continuing ed. requirements, new tests/techniques to master
 - fear of ethical complaints, potential death & suicide of patients
- Feminization of clinical psychology:
 - APA: 34% female in 1985; 53% female in 2007, projected to be 60% in 2010
 - males represent <20% of internship and clinical graduate student population over last 5 years

Want a Job?

- Great psychologist jobs available in Winnipeg
- Lots of faculty jobs across country (academic positions for clinical vs. experimental)
- Demand is HIGH for psychologists in Northern & Rural positions (avg is 1 psychologist per 9000 people in rural areas):
